





REMEMBERING THE REFLECTIONS AT THE ROOF GARDEN

> hen you arrived at the Roof Garden Ballroom on July 17, 1965, to see Bobby Goldsboro and the "Fun A-Go-

Go" show, you were in for a surprise. That was the inclusion of Detroit, Michigan's Reflections on this show. Both Goldsboro and the Reflections were backed up by the Grooves out of New York City.

The Reflections had already hit the national charts with their smash hit, "Just Like Romeo & Juliet/Can't You Tell By The Look In My Eyes" (Golden World 8) in March of 1964. They arrived in Okoboji a full 16 months after the Reflections had their first chart hit.

The story of the Reflections begins in Detroit in 1963 when friends Tony Micale — lead vocals, Phil Castrodale — first tenor, Dan Bennie — second tenor, Ray Steinberg — baritone and bass singer John Dean all enjoyed singing with each other. It was not long before they were heard by Ed Wingate, the owner of Golden World Records, who signed the group to Golden World based upon all the successful live shows they were having around Detroit.

They brought in Freddie Gorman to produce the session as he was also a producer at Motown Records. Groman was the one who got the mix for the Reflections that was halfway between doo-wop and "blue eyed soul" that was so well captured on "Just Like Romeo and Juliet." They recorded their legendary vocal tracks at RCA's Studios in Chicago. The instrumental tracks were recorded in Detroit. They used many of Motown's session musicians to play on the record.

Just as they were getting the record released, they learned there was another band from Winnipeg, Canada call Chad Allen & The Reflections that had a new record and LP about to come out, called "Shakin All Over." The Canadian group did not challenge Detroit's Reflections name, but instead, changed their name to the Guess Who!

"Just Like Romeo & Juliet" was a smash chart success for the Reflections. The song debuted on "Billboard's Hot 100" survey in April of 1964 and charted at No. 86. By the end of May of '64 the song was at No. 6 on the Billboard charts. Because of the success of the song, the Reflections were touring across the U.S. It was one of those tours that brought



them to Okoboji. In 1966 Tony Micale would leave the group and was replaced by new lead vocalist, Frank Amodeo.

Next up they released "Like Columbus Did/ Lonely Girl" for Golden World Records (12). That was followed up with: "Talkin' About My Girl/Oowee Now Now" (GW 15), "Don't Do That To Me/I'm Just A Guy" (GW 16), "Poor Man's Son/Comin' At You" (GW 20) and "Deborah Ann/Wheelin' & Dealin," (Golden World 22). The group never saw the chart success with any of their other releases as compared to "Just Like Romeo & Juliet."

"Just Like Romeo & Juliet" has been covered

by such artists as: Sha Na Na, Ultimate Spinach, Fallen Angels, the Outsiders, Stephen Bishop, Jim Stringer, Little Caesar & The Consuls and also by Australia's Mental As Anything. Winona, Minnesota's Michael & The Messengers released "Just Like Romeo & Juliet" for Chicago's USA Records that saw significant chart success in 1967.

The group can be described as a "One Hit Wonder," but what a hit it was. Today original member Tony Micale still leads the Reflections along with Gary Banovetz, Sal Prado and Joey Finazzo. Sadly Dan Bennie, John Dean and Frank Amodeo have all passed away. During the '60s they appeared on American Bandstand and such TV shows as: Shindig, Shivery, Shaboom and Hulabaloo. They toured with Dick Clark's Caravan of Stars and appeared in the movie, "Winter A Go-Go."

Some of those "one hit wonders" had amazing successful careers in music and many still stand tall today for what they accomplished. I know many of you went to the Roof Garden to see Bobby Goldsboro, but you got a real music surprise when Detroit's Reflections took the stage as well.

OST ADDS 'BROADWAY BOOTCAMP' TO SUMMER 2024

> he first ever Boji Bantam Broadway Bootcamp will be held July 8-13 on the campus of the Okoboji Summer Theatre in Okoboji. It is a new musical theater weeklong intensive for young people.

The five-day intensive will include daily classes focused on acting, voice and movement. Students will spend each morning on movement, voice work and acting technique. The afternoons will focus on creating a culminating showcase that the students will perform on July 13.

"We are excited for this intensive. The classes will be a great way for students to learn musical theater basics from OST staff and working professionals. It will be a rigorous week but also very supportive and inspiring," said Madison Dodd, director of the Boji Bantam Children's Theatre and will also direct the Bootcamp.

"This is something new for us here at OST and we are so pumped about offering this opportunity to young people," Ruth Ann Burke, OST Executive Director stated.

Classes will meet July 8-12 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. with the Saturday showcase performance at 10 a.m. on July 13. The "Bootcamp" is designed for ages 12 and older. Tuition is \$375. For more info or to register visit okobojisummertheare.org.

OST is the training ground for theatrical students enrolled at Stephens College in Columbia, Missouri. The college staff is joined by theatrical professionals from all over the United States who come here to teach and perform. The summer semester at Okoboji provides area residents and viewers with the opportunity to enjoy seven live theatrical productions in seven weeks. Plus, the Boji Bantam Children's Theatre portion of the campus will be presenting "The Emperor's New Clothes" at 10:30 a.m. July 3-6.

The OST box office opens at 10 a.m. on June 17. However, tickets may also be purchased by email at boxoffice@okobojisummertheatre.org.





SPIRIT LAKE'S STEVENS BLOCK

hey came, they saw, they invested: That is the story of B.F. Stevens, of St. Louis, Missouri, and his brother, Stephen Stevens.

Described as a "St. Louis millionaire," Benamin F. Stevens was a substantial stockholder and one time president of Liggett & Myers Tobacco Company of St. Lou-

is. St. Louis, by 1885 it was the largest producer of plug chewing tobacco in the U.S. chewing tobacco then being far more common than smoking.

First noted in newspapers here in an 1886 property sale, B.F. Stevens was probably made aware of the Iowa Great Lakes by a cousin, Frank Hopkins, an early steamship operator with a landing at the foot of Lake Street.

Stevens quickly built a substantial cottage still standing — but soon bought the Kingman farm in 1891, intending to make it the most advanced dairy farm in America.

A tall cooling tower was built at the Kingman place, extending above the oak trees. It served

as a popular observation point for Big Spirit until becoming unsafe and was torn down in 1948.

Steve Stevens (as he was known locally), spent more time at The Lakes than his brother but was still financially well-connected.

The Stevens brothers spared

no expense bringing the best horses, ponies, and livestock to the area — and distance was no object. Steve Stevens also served as a city councilman, but resigned in 1895.

The Stevens Block

In the 1880s, the site of the Stevens Block was part business, part eyesore. Ramshackle wooden structures built in the 1870s or earlier were showing their age, including the Beacon Block, where the Spirit Lake Beacon offices were, and the 1858 Marcus Snyder building, one of the oldest downtown.

Ideally, though, the site was on the main street between the rail station and the Hopkins' East Okoboji steamship landing — a desirable location.

> The Stevens Block passed to local merchant H.A. Miller at one point. In a subzero day at the end of 1927, a fire in the rear of the Doudna Drug store severely damaged the building, gutting the opera house, meeting spaces, the







drug store, Peterson hardware store, and post office. The building was saved, but much original character was lost in repair and updating.

Numerous owners and tenants have occupied the building in decades since. It is currently under careful renovation with a hope to restore its importance to Spirit Lake business. And the brothers?

Both Stevens men were Civil War veterans, having enlisted in the 15th Iowa Infantry. B.F. Stevens died at age 75 in Martinsville, Virginia, in 1916 and is buried there. His brother Steve continued to seek help at veterans sanitariums with little effect. He died in 1923 in California, but was so disconnected from the Iowa Great Lakes by then that his passing wasn't noted until 1925.
